



## Christ, Whose Glory Fills the Skies 662



This well-crafted morning hymn opens by celebrating daylight as an image of Christ, the true Light, then ponders life without light, and culminates in a prayer for inward light. The tune's name honors its German roots: Ratisbon is the former English name for Regensburg.

Like Isaac Watts's "When I Survey the Wondrous Cross" (nos. 223, 224), this hymn is a reflection on Galatians 6:14, but this text is more abstract and devotes no attention to the person hanging on the cross. The tune is named for a soloist in the composer's Connecticut choir.

# "Healer of Our Every III" Ephesians 5:6-14 Pollocksville Presbyterian Church 3.22.20 Fourth Sunday in Lent Second Sunday in the COVID-19 Pandemic

Sermon #48

Ephesians 5:6-14 Common English Bible (CEB)

6 Nobody should deceive you with stupid ideas. God's anger comes down on those who are disobedient because of this kind of thing. 7 So you shouldn't have anything to do with them.8 You were once darkness, but now you are light in the Lord, so live your life as children of light. 9 Light produces fruit that consists of every sort of goodness, justice, and truth.10 Therefore, test everything to see what's pleasing to the Lord, 11 and don't participate in the unfruitful actions of darkness. Instead, you should reveal the truth about them. 12 It's embarrassing to even talk about what certain persons do in secret. 13 But everything exposed to the light is revealed by the light. 14 Everything that is revealed by the light is light. Therefore, it says, Wake up, sleeper! Get up from the dead, and Christ will shine on you.

The Word of the LORD. Thanks be to God.

Let us pray: May the words of my mouth and the meditations of our hearts be acceptable in your sight, O God, our Rock and our Redeemer. Amen.

When I had done some worship planning earlier this year, I made an intentional effort to name my sermons after one of the hymns we would sing in the service during Lent. For example, "Grace Greater than Our Sin" was on March 1. March 8 was "Beneath the Cross of Jesus". Last week was "O God, Who Gives Us Life". This week is "Healer of Our Every III". Yet, we've had to make adjustments during this time and.....I'm a pragmatist, not a purist. Sometimes you have to adapt your plans, which, for each of us right now in this room or those listening online, adapting is what we're all doing.

Even though the hymn is not being sung by all of us, I can sing some of it for you:

Healer of our every ill, Light of each tomorrow, Give us peace beyond our fear, And hope beyond our sorrow.

Honestly, these words, which are the refrain to the hymn, have given me a lot of hope. I'm sure for the church in Ephesus, they needed a word, too.

For that particular congregation in Ephesus, as some scholars believe, they were mainly a Gentile community. There was temptation to behave not as children of light, but as children of ignorance. Remember, Rome ruled. And Rome dictated what was appropriate and inappropriate behavior. Lots of temptation to act foolish and not as children of the LORD. Not as children of light. And Paul is calling them out on it.

For these converts, they need to be reminded of who they are and whose they are. They are Christians and they are children of light. Not children of ignorance. These new converts are still tempted to live lifestyles contrary to the gospel-greed, impurity, and corruption. These Christians in Ephesus must be reminded, like we have to be reminded, that it is through Christ

our LORD we have new life. And it is in that new life, the light shines on our ignorance and we are to behave appropriately.

For many in this ancient congregation, there was an illness. It wasn't necessarily physical, but a spiritual illness.....or maybe another phrase could be "spiritual conflict". Even though they were converts, that didn't mean they would easily turn from their old ways. This illness or this conflict would be something they would have to deal with. Yet, as Paul continues in this letter and, right here in Ephesians 5:6-14, the light of the LORD will shine. The light will shine and will guide us to act as God's children instead of children in ignorance. And again, it's not a one and done thing.....it's a lifelong process.

I think what ticks Paul off the most in these verses we've read together is that these Christians are being seduced by other Christians. They've tried to act out of their own self-interests and impulses that they look no better than the people ruling from Rome. Yet, Paul is calling for each person to be exposed to the light. To live in the light. To call on the light of God to reveal what is fruitful behavior and what is dangerous behavior.

I keep going back to the words I sang earlier. As I've said before, we are seeing behavior across the spectrum in response to COVID-19. I see the good and want to lift that up! I also see the bad: Hoarding, recklessness, fear, selfishness, etc. Yet, I can't help but sing:

Healer of our every ill, Light of each tomorrow, Give us peace beyond our fear, And hope beyond our sorrow.

These words were written 34 years ago. Marty Haugen, who wrote the words and music, was in Washington State when the space shuttle Challenger crashed shortly before takeoff and composed this refrain as a response.

Yes, our God physically heals. And we certainly need that, no doubt. Our God also heals the wounds that are not physical. God Our LORD heals the fear. Our LORD heals the sorrow. Our LORD gives us a Spirit of comfort, light, kindness, and compassion to face each day......knowing that each day can be a struggle, just like it was for our spiritual ancestors in Ephesus.

Siblings in Christ, I wish I could tell you how it will all work out. But, we know that's not possible. We don't know how long this situation will last. We don't know what's next. But, we do know we are children of light. We are children of the LORD and we are to act like it. We are to bring a word of peace to frightened people we will continue to see. We are to be a non-anxious presence as we go through the grocery store. We are to be the loving presence our world needs to see.

Let us go forward in hope, peace, faith, and love knowing that the Spirit has blazed the trail for us throughout these uncertain days ahead.

In the name of God the Creator, God the Redeemer, and God the Sustainer. Amen.
